








### Where are the Frontiers for our Schools in 2015?



### Education is about Depth - A 'Frontier'

4 questions from Fr General

1. How deeply do we respond to our students' needs....their deepest hungers for meaning and purpose?

- 2. How deeply do we help our students see? The real beyond the virtual? See people in real need and on the margins?
- 3. How deeply do we invite our students to think? (vs fundamentalism and fanaticism)
- 4. How deeply do we form our students' inner persons?

#### Interview of Fr Antonio Spadaro with Pope Francis, 2013

"What element of Ignatian spirituality helps you live your ministry?"

"Discernment," he replies.

"Discernment is one of the things that worked inside St. Ignatius. For him it is an instrument of struggle in order to know the Lord and follow him more closely."

"...the test of our education as Jesuit (and Singapore) education is if we are able to produce people of discernment."

1. Do our students, as a result of their time with us, end up with a broader sense of belonging and responsibility than their own families, classes, clans?

# 2. Can we break out of our narrow sense of belonging to this particular school?

3. Can we break out of our particular school system and serve those outside the Jesuit (read CEO) system in Singapore (read other JCAP Provinces and regions)?

4. Can we break out of our concern for the Philippines (read **Australia and Singapore)** and start thinking of how more we can serve the wider world of Asia around us?







Figure 3: Pictorial Representation of the Victoria Scale<sup>66</sup>




