The Catholic Education Conference 2023 brought participants together to reflect on pathways to Growing in Faith and Synergising as a Community.

Inspired by the Word of God through the Eucharistic Celebration with Cardinal William Goh and led by Keynote Speaker Mr Lawrence Chong (CEO of Consulus), participants were inspired to centre their lives on Jesus, "and we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His Purpose" (Romans 8:28).

I do want to inspire my students to be good, warm hearted and kind to others. And I hope that I am leading by example.


